Spotlight on learning

This week, we hear from Year 5 & 6 who have been inspired by the work of Walter De La Mere to create poems and descriptive writing about the forest. We have used his poem 'The Listeners' to create some very atmospheric writing with a focus on expanded noun phrases and relative clauses. We have also created 'human sentences' to explore how changing the word order in a sentence can create greater impact.

In Science, the children have been learning about the circulatory system. This week, they role-played being blood, transported by the heart to the lungs and around the body to distribute the oxygen.

In RE, the children are exploring the enquiry question, 'What does the Qur'an reveal to Muslims about Allah and his guidance?'

So far they have discovered how the Qur'an was revealed to the Prophet Muhammad and how Muslims memorise the Qur'an to help them live their lives according to Allah's guidance.

Finally, we have enjoyed learning about the Ancient Egyptians during our history lessons. This unit will continue for the rest of the term when we will research hieroglyphs, Tutenkhamun and many other aspects of Ancient Egyptian life





We are very thankful for all of the donations but to keep this space manageable, please could future donations be items with the school logo on.





